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whether or not a judge has the services of a referee to handle various aspects of their caseload would be material to how hard the judge is working,...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...would it not?

SENATOR LINDSAY: It may be material to how hard the judge is working, but not necessarily to whether resources are fairly allocated.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: But I thought the notion was to allocate resources where judges were overworked as opposed to where they were underworked.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Yeah, and in a....

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: ...in a perfect world, you would...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yeah. And perhaps one other element that the Judicial Resources Commission might explore in their report, I take it, that would help satisfy some of your concerns is whether or not a judge acts as a judge in another district and, in fact lightens a caseload in that district without getting any credit for it.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Yes.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Okay. So if the Judicial Resources Commission comes to us with a report and it considers all of these elements in a rational and substantial way, then you would agree that they have done their job and should...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: ...get an extension on life.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I've been saved by the bell, but my light is on and I'll continue that on my time.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: All right, thank you, Senator.
