

Lindsay's amendment, then we would strike all the...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...original provisions of the bill, and all that we would have before us is what you and Senator Jones...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...had offered.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: The one thing...the one thing that is mildly troublesome to me is the striking of the provision, actually explicitly requiring the Attorney General to review the process. I think that, while it's arguably not necessary, I think it's an appropriate direction to the Attorney General. That would be the third part of Senator Lindsay's amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you don't mind striking the first section.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No, I do not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: But I want to assure you, Senator, that it is...Senator Jones is the primary sponsor of the amendment and I believe it would be up to him to express any objections he might have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if you don't object, he doesn't object. But let me show you how much confidence Senator Jones has in you. Senator Jones, I'd like to ask you a question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jones, in a sense, Senator Wickersham, trained and licensed to practice law in Nebraska, has given us a statement as to the significance of Senator Lindsay's amendment and at least insofar as striking the first section of the green copy he sees no problem with it. Do you see a problem with it?
