

left over would go to the appropriate marketing development funds that are used by farmers, the Nebraska Corn Development, Utilization, and Marketing Fund, and the Grain Sorghum Development, Utilization, and Marketing Fund; the money left over would go to these funds in proportionate as to how they are collected. I suspect that when the year 2000 comes around, the Legislature is going to micromanage how much General Fund goes into this at the tail end, and there will be very little money left over. And considering the farmers are going to subject themselves to a three-quarter of a cent checkoff on corn and grain sorghum, that the appropriate place to leave any money that might be left over would be to the farmer controlled checkoff fund. That is, basically, what this amendment does. So I would offer this for your consideration.
