

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Hall, will you yield?

SENATOR HALL: Yes.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Senator, how do we find out how many electors there are?

SENATOR HALL: We basically look at how many people are residents of the state, Senator Robinson, and we determine whether or not they've reached the age of 19 for purposes of electors as I understand the definition. I guess we do it the same way we did it prior to 1988.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Who keeps that information? Excuse me, who keeps that information, just...

SENATOR HALL: I don't know. But that's what we want to go back to.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Are we capable of getting that information?

SENATOR HALL: I'm sure that after a census that information is available but it would be dated, depending on how far away from the last census you were.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Does it...I guess my question, say you're...

SENATOR HALL: If you use...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Hold on. This really doesn't have anything to do with the number of signatures required in petition because you can change that level any...we can change that any way we would like to if we get enough votes. Is that correct?

SENATOR HALL: Well...

SENATOR ROBINSON: The elect...just what, passing year, I mean that would, if there's more than the registered voters would be more but that doesn't mean we can't change that number, right?

SENATOR HALL: This would change the term registered voters back to electors the way it was prior to the constitutional amendment.
