

25, that it really was necessary it would pass. But we've... obviously in the years that's changed. It's always kind of assumed that because it's a priority bill or because it's on the floor we assume it's going to pass, it must be doing good, unless somebody can come up and state why we shouldn't do it. I think we should go back to more the other way, even if it was on one of my bills. If it doesn't show anything and I can't convince people it's a good idea that it should be defeated, and some of them have been and some of them have not been. So I rise to ask that the bill be indefinitely postponed for really a couple reasons. Number one, I think if people really search down in their hearts they know the bill doesn't change anything that we already have. And I've told my constituents, my constituents have talked to me and they've said, you know, David, when you guys are down there how come you spend so much time talking about things that don't really matter that much? And I said, you're right, you know. And so I kind of said to myself that when we get to issues that really don't do anything, it's easy to say, I'm going to go ahead and vote for it because the cattlemen will be happy, my rural constituents will be happy, but it doesn't do anything, so what the heck. But I've kind of changed my philosophy, I guess, this year and become more rational in some of my behavior patterns, some would argue that I suppose. But I'm not going to vote for things that simply are feel good but do nothing, I'm just not going to do that and I don't think the body should. And argue as we can and argue as they should, Senator Jones, I'm sorry, Jim, you're a good friend, but this... there is nothing the state can pass that can affect anything at the federal level. And I know that the horse was belly deep in sagebrush and other things that were in the ravine, but when we were in committee, in fact some of the urban senators on the committee thought the horse had no legs, they couldn't see the legs on the horse, they were a king how high is the belly of a horse, to find out what it... how tall the weeds really were. But when we asked the question, would this legislation change any of that that happened? The answer was, no. It was a good example of what you're talking about, Senator Jones, but this bill did... has nothing to do with that. It wouldn't help one way or another, it was declared a wetlands and that would have happened regardless of whether this bill was in effect or not. Senator Landis pointed out the Attorney General does all of this now. There are... I don't want to...
