

passed so that the ban also included December. The experience from that ban has been such that there's relatively little yard waste picked up that does have to run separate trucks in Lincoln. It was indicated that the cost for that month was something like \$40,000 for 35 ton, which come out to like \$1,000 a ton, which obviously is expensive and unreasonable. The committee, Natural Resources Committee put the bill out to put the date for ending the ban on yardfill-landfills to be December 1 as it was originally introduced. And based on experience, I believe, this would be an appropriate cut-off time, so I'd move that the amendment be adopted.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Mr. Speaker, I understand this is a very difficult issue for many members to probably understand, but even such I would ask that they adopt the amendment that's been proved by Senator Warner and myself.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Maurstad. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Warner, I didn't hear completely. This is just exactly as the bill was advanced from committee, is it not? Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: There are no further lights on. Senator Warner, would you like to close? Closing is waived. Question is the adoption of the Warner amendment. All in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Warner and Senator Maurstad's amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: The amendment is adopted. Anything further on the bill?

CLERK: Nothing further, Mr. President.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Mr. Speaker, with a great deal of pride I move to advance LB 42 to E & R for engrossing.

SPEAKER WITHEM: You've heard the motion. All those in favor vote aye. Opposed. It is advanced. LB 112.
