SENATOR CHAMBERS: Because you were around then, weren't you?

I differ with what Senator Wehrbein said, I don't think there is a solid knowledge on the part of the members of the Legislature about the situation that exists in China today. Well, let me ask Senator Wehrbein another...

SPEAKER WITHEM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...question.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, what is the situation with reference to the use of child labor in Taiwan to produce various products that are sold around the world?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I cannot tell you exactly, except that they have come a long way in the last several years in the humanitarian aspect and in their democratization of their republic. That's all I can tell you, that that has improved a lot. That's all I can tell you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But let me ask you specifically about child labor, do you know anything about that?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No, I do not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: My time is up, so I have to put my light on again.
