

the question of germaneness and established what I thought was a fairly narrow...and I established it, a fairly narrow view of germaneness and the body voted to support that. I then turn around and leave the floor for a few minutes to take care of some business and I come back and I see we're now dealing with an amendment which is...LB 37, I believe, is still a bill dealing with insurance and the requirements of individuals to carry automobile insurance and how that will be verified. And I now see something before me dealing with the tax commissioner, a valuation of motor vehicles for taxation purposes. It appears to me to be at least as far afield or maybe more so than the Preister amendment was, so I am raising the point of order that no part of AM1390 should be before us at this point because it is not germane to LB 37.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Withem, you are saying that none of the amendment is germane?

SPEAKER WITHEM: As I understand it from the summary provided by Senator Schellpeper, I would question the germaneness of the contents of AM1390. Whether you only have the one section before you to rule upon at this point is, you know, a procedural matter that will have to be worked out. But I'm raising the germaneness question.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Withem. Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I withdraw the amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: I...is there unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment? Any objection? Seeing none, it is withdrawn. Are there any further amendments to LB 37?

CLERK: I have nothing further pending to LB 37 at this time, Madam President.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Coordsen, would you like to close on LB 37? Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Madam President, I would move to advance LB 37 to E & R for engrossing.
