Severability clause, thank you, Senator Hall. That's not connected to LB 65. Regarding some of the earlier comments about not bringing bills back on Final Reading, we have the procedure for doing that in order to deal with a bill any way that we feel is necessary at any stage of consideration, so my comments do not go to that at all...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...it just goes to this point, that I don't believe even if you put this in the Nebraska statutes that it can be enforced by a Nebraska court. I don't believe it. Even though...let me ask Senator Kristensen a question. Senator Kristensen, and this is a stretch, but if a person is required to be a member of the Bar Association in order to be a state judge but there is no such requirement of a federal judge, does that mean that a federal judge cannot serve as a federal judge in Nebraska if not a member of the Bar Association? I'd asked Senator Kristensen a question...

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and he answered it but I didn't hear it.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: It wasn't on the record. I do not believe that. I don't think that you can restrict that in that manner.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, and because my time is just up, I'm not going to ask a question that you can't answer and I can't fully...

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Yield to Chambers.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Chambers.
