SPEAKER WITHEM: Your amendment is withdrawn. Is that correct? Thank you, Senator Witek. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Hall would move to amend. Senator, this is the amendment, page 1, line 9 of AM1371. strike the word "a minor" and insert "under the age of nineteen". (FA140 appears on page 1612 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. President, and members, this is a handwritten amendment that I passed out to you and really it relates back to the discussion that Senator Matzke and I had the other day on this bill. It was a question I had with regard to what does a minor...what's the definition of a minor. And I believe both he and Senator Bromm stated that it was under the age of...an individual under the age of nineteen who was unmarried. And all we do with this amendment is strike "minor" and clarify that it is an individual under the age of nineteen so there is not a different interpretation than that, that I believe it was Senator Bromm quoted from a section of statute that it would entail. It just...I look on it as a clarifying amendment that just lays out the specific intent of the term "minor", and would urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Hall. Senator Witek, did you wish to address this? Your light was still on. Senator Matzke.

SENATOR MATZKE: Well, I think, Mr. Speaker, and members, I think I probably owe Senator Hall an apology because in our last discussion of this las week he asked me what was meant by minor and I suggested that it might be someone who is 20 years of age. I'm afraid my frame of reference was that young people under 21 years of age cannot drink liquor and so I was thinking in terms of minority being 21, and I was very pleased that Senator Bromm corrected me on that. In this context, a minor would be 19. So I think Senator Hall's amendment in this regard probably lays it out clearer and better and his amendment should be adopted.
