SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: If, and, again, I'm on secondhand information, but I wanted to check to make sure, are you...have you filed or are you contemplating filing an amendment that would strike the portion of the bill dealing with the mother's right to rescind her decision that would leave us then to the way the law is now, that as once the decision is made, it's final?

SENATOR BROMM: I have filed that amendment.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay, it is filed? Okay. One of the things I would suggest, possibly, to Senator Chambers, I was unaware that that amendment is filed, that perhaps what we could do is I believe that amendment may take care of Senator Chambers' concern. It may and it may not. Senator Chambers says it will not, but my concern, certainly, would be alleviated a great deal by your amendment at some point. So I will...if this doesn't, if Senator Chambers' amendment doesn't go, I certainly will be looking forward to your amendment that will be pending as well.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Wesely, on the Bernard-Stevens amendment.

SENATOR WESELY: Madam President, members, I understand Senator Bernard-Stevens attempt to try and reach a compromise on this, but even with the 14-day issue, I think...I think, again, we are crossing into territory that is turning very carefully, and so I, again, would oppose the Bernard-Stevens' amendment. It does make it more palatable, but still this is a significant issue, and I know I don't want to say that we didn't look at it. You know, we looked at a lot of different issues here, but I think to do this would cause a lot, a lot of consternation and concern, and I think I'd rather see us proceed now without adopting either the Bernard-Stevens or the Chambers amendment.
