

am going to get angry? No, because I know that I am the exception to that, and the exception to a lot of things on this floor. I don't need anybody on this floor to validate my worth or value. But I will tell you what is needed on this floor, and needed for the record, which we are putting together now, a clear articulation of the right that a woman should have to change her mind about giving up a baby, and a clear and very extensive record of the resistance to giving the woman that right by people who on another day are going to talk about the bonding that takes place between a mother and a child. My good friend Senator Wesely, tall in the saddle, Don Wesely, Big Red, is going to stand up here on another day and talk about and be very persuasive, almost tear-jerking about mothers and their rights, especially poor mothers; yeah, poor mothers, except when it comes to having their children taken away from them. Then a blind spot develops, and I will tell you why, because too many people have other bills that they are thinking about and wondering how the members are going to respond to those bills. And that's often what determines what is going to be done on this floor. Some of the people are carrying bills this year because they have an eye to their election next time, and they know what their opponents said against them. So we are dealing always with situational ethics on this floor. Nothing is quite what it appears to be, and nothing means exactly what the speaker says that it means. And that's why when somebody asks a question, how much is eight plus eight, they cannot say eight plus eight equals sixteen. They say, well, eight plus eight is four times four, eight plus eight is twenty minus four, but they can't bring themselves to say it the way that it is. And because there are others who use language loaded with chameleon terminology, they think I will do the same thing.

SPEAKER WITHEM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will not. I want to be understood and I want my words to be clear. When we come to these other issues, we are going to have a transcript of the discussion that occurred today, and the one bill that I keep mentioning by number is LB 592, and when we have that discussion, I plan to make some resort to the transcription of these debates.
