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proposals occasionally appearing in the media referring to a petition process for some type of reduction or limitation or elimination of property taxes. And I...this will not interfere or have any effect on that probably one way or the other. But what I think is important, if this bill is introduced in the process that we're talking about, that even if the Legislature does not place this amendment on the ballot or this format, this concept, when we convene in 1996, if some of these other proposals that may go around with petitions, and if those were successful many of the things that will be discussed between now and the next session would still be appropriate, still be a factor if any of those kinds of proposals were to be adopted by the people of Nebraska. And so whether or not we are directing the discussion to this resolution, which I hope at least will give it a better structure than to do nothing. But it will have that additional benefit, I think, of helping people to understand the consequences if any of these kind of proposals are adopted. And finally, I want to say only that it is an exceedingly complex issue, as all of you are well aware. When we start making any of these kinds of changes, the number of other affects are almost without limit, and the need to have a coordinated effort with many committees of the Legislature is what I would anticipate. Obviously, if you look at some of these proposals, Education would be involved, Urban Affairs Committee would be involved, the Governmental Committee would be involved, in some cases Judiciary, certainly Education if I haven't mentioned it, Natural Resources may be involved. It's going to be a major effort for all of us over the next several months once we start this route. But I would urge that the rule be suspended to allow for the introduction of the resolution so a process can begin to address this issue statewide, and not only...perhaps come up with an appropriate conclusion at the end of that discussion, but along with it provide an opportunity to not only inform ourselves of all the options that might exist, but also assist in providing that kind of background to the citizens across the state. I also should add, on this handout, while there are a number of things suggested as possibilities, other things that are not included obviously are items that there have been bills introduced, some which are pending in committees, which could be added to what has been spelled out here. But this is more of a beginning place for the project, and in no way should it be considered that the proposal that has been handed out is some kind of a limiting factor, because it's not intended to be, and in fact is not.
