And another thing that we got to think about is the age of the people out there in the...and our courthouses, the age of the farmers and ranchers is about 60 years old now and they're wanting to cut back, and they'll have less income, they're going to rent it out, or something is going to happen to the ground because there is no young person out there that's going to take over anymore. So I think we really got to think about something because the taxes that they pay is going to stay about level, but the taxes the local governments are just continuing to go up. So I really commend the Revenue Committee for getting this started. It's the first step, and I think we go from there. Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Robinson.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I rise to support the suspension of the rules to move the constitutional amendment back to the Revenue Committee for hearings. And I don't know how many of you went through this, but I think in the first four pages I cringed about five or six times. So it's not going to be easy for anyone, especially people that are running for office next year. Thank goodness I'm not running for office next year. But the...I did run through there and I didn't see any tax on pork, but I got to thinking maybe this is the bill to reduce the pork, huh? I think that's probably what it is. I'm not trying to be smart but it sort of chimes in there. I went to some budget hearings this summer. I went to a hearing over at the Arlington School District, and there were probably about 40 people there. And believe me they were disgusted, they were upset about their property tax. I thought the superintendent did a great job of telling them what...if they wanted to reduce their property tax, said, well we can cut out the buses for \$100,000, we can cut out the activities and she listed four or five other things, cut out the buses and several different things. But believe me those people are very concerned. I went to the budget hearing at Washington County and there were about 15 or 20 people. And the county...the county does a real good job, I think they only raised their budget about two and a half, three percent. But those people were frustrated. In my own school district at Blair, in the last two years, two years ago the property taxes went up, property taxes, not the budget, property taxes went up 12 percent, last year they went up 6 percent, and on May 23rd we're going to vote on a \$10 million bond issue. And I talked to a lot of people and I think probably the bond issue will have a tough (inaudible). It's not
