

you or we know from those records when they come in they are Medicaid eligible.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay. So you're telling me Senator Wesely would look at those people whether they are Medicaid eligible or not then, right?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Right. I'm telling you that people here on the floor, all of us who may have parents who would be in the hospital who maybe aren't Medicaid eligible when they go in, would go through that interview process if they thought they were going to go to a nursing home and they would have to show their financial records to determine if they will be Medicaid eligible in a year.

SENATOR ROBINSON: So they would have to do that?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes.

SENATOR ROBINSON: They would have to do that. I was telling Senator Hartnett, I said, you know they may be looking at you and I, you never know, so...

SENATOR BOHLKE: They very well could have.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, thank you.
