

they're trying to do is determine how much protection to give, how much control there should be to certain drugs out there, controlled substances, and they give them different schedules. And every year sometimes they'll move those around, some become more dangerous, some become less dangerous, and this amendment makes those changes based on the federal changes that have been forthcoming. So essentially that and some other cleanup language is what the amendment does. The Health Department has signed off on the amendment and the pharmacists have signed off on it. There was another provision of 404, when it came in, that was quite controversial, that is deleted from the bill, so what remains I don't think has any problem. But I'd ask for adoption of the amendment and be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Wesely, I can't support this bill unless you can quickly go through all these drug and recite them very rapidly so that I understand what you're talking about.

SENATOR WESELY: (Mumbles.) (Laugh.) I'll get Pat O'Donnell to do that and we'll all be...

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Wesely, would you yield to a question? I guess I missed the first part of it and I'm sorry I was off the floor for a while. Is this a will that also was heard in committee?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, LB 404.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: LB 404? And I guess before I raise the question of germaneness, I'm just wondering, I'm just looking at the...this is the bill then that made changes in the drug and narcotic section of the Criminal Code, right?

SENATOR WESELY: Among other things it was...right.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay. Once again, it's not that I'm
