

SENATOR HALL: To what degree? To \$500,000 degree?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: To the degree...well, it will be more than that, Senator, because you misportrayed earlier the property tax savings. And, I mean, that's fine, but you realize that's not true that you just can't...

SENATOR HALL: Oh, I don't believe so. I don't think I misportrayed anything, but that's...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, okay.

SENATOR HALL: ...we just disagree.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, that's fair.

SENATOR HALL: I, again, rise in support of the amendment. All it does is clarify what the commission shall be required to do. Think about it, ladies and gentlemen, because all the items that are listed are mandated in this proposal. And you're talking about a proposal that's painted to somehow provide indigent services where, in fact, it's the last thing listed, it was merely an oversight by...as Senator Kristensen stated, but it's listed as the last of the list for purposes of what's going to be done, but yet these individuals, however many are going to be found...

SPEAKER WITHEM: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: ...in the commission and in the...that are going to work in this area under the chief counsel, they're going to have these duties that they are required to do. And they are required to do that. They are also required to provide legal services. In terms of being able to do these types of proposals, I think what you are doing, at best, is diluting their effort in terms of providing the legal services to indigent persons. And you inherently allow for that to happen with the retention of Section 1 and Section 9 of the proposal, which spell out that, hey, they can handle their own internal management. They can adopt and promulgate rules and regs that allow them to complete the purpose that they were allowed for under this act, and, yeah, they specifically are to provide legal services to indigent persons through divisions in Section 12 of this act. It's very easy to understand. The
