There are people of means who have no objection to shifting responsibility when it comes to low taxes will be derived but they're opposed to redistributing the wealth of the society and what we're facing now is a matter of priorities. There is a study that came out and it reflects what has been known down through the years. The wealthiest 1 percent, the wealthiest 1 percent of the people in this country control 40 percent of the nation's wealth. One percent controls 40 percent. The top 20 percent of the people control 80 percent of the country's wealth; 20 percent of the people control 80 percent of the country's wealth. When you get to the lower 20 percent of the population in terms of means, they control 6 percent. One percent at the top controls 40 percent. Expand that to the top 20 percent and they control 80 percent. You get down to the bottom 20 percent of the population and they control 6 percent. So the wealth is there but it's in too few hands and that's why we have problems of this kind. We're not willing to go after the people with the means. You talk about property tax relief, you have double dippers like Jaksha and some of these other people who want the benefits that society as a whole make available to property owners, streets, street lights, fire, police and all these other things, but they don't want to pay for it. So when we have a bill of this kind I'm going to watch very carefully and see if, as some of those who support it are saying, that the money is going to be directed toward the children who really have the needs and that, by doing what this bill attempts to do, they're not going to be hurt. What I see happening though is when you put a responsibility on one of these state departments who undertake studies and so forth, they're going to hire very expensive consultants. They're going to say in their department they lack the person power and the persons they have lack the expertise so they've got to hire some of these consultants...
