

people have raised a number of good questions. Senator Janssen deals with this in a very practical, everyday situation. Senator Cudaback raised the issues that actually some clients have said that they do not want to move in this direction. Senator Chambers raises the issue of nutrition, and Senator Lynch raises the issue of what has happened in past history. I, in fact, think that there have been enough concerns raised that people are not ready probably to support this particular waiver at this time, and I think that we will have the opportunity, after the pilot project, before we take it statewide, to revisit. And I think, as I've indicated, Senator Witek has an amendment later on to see if, at that point, we'll be able to move forward with the debit card. I think we eventually will do that in this state, and so with all of that in mind and considering the debate we've had, I plan to support Senator Janssen and recognize that there are enough people who are hesitant for many different reasons to move forward on this waiver, that we should support...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...Senator Janssen and then after the pilot project and we come back we will have an opportunity before we go statewide, if we are ready to move towards the debit card or some other form. I think, personally, food stamps have a problem, the status quo is not working. But I think enough valid concerns have been raised that I will support Senator Janssen.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. The question before you is the adoption of the Janssen amendment to LB 455. All those in favor vote aye; all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: (Read record vote as found on page 1756 of the Legislative Journal.) 33 ayes, 6 nays on the adoption of Senator Janssen's amendment.
