

recognize and Senator Schimek asked the question that there are five states that visitation interference is a crime, either a misdemeanor or a felony charge. So other states are handling it in different ways. Senator Witek brought up about our records being inaccurate and I agree totally, and I don't think there's anybody that's going to deny that the records are in top form. We are developing a computer system and I passed out a sheet of paper telling you where that all is with the Department of Social Service and with the court system on child support. So I think we are working our way to be there. That is why there is the due process put into here where there can be administrative hearings on child support. They can go in and say this is wrong and they can get it clarified. I think that's very important to have and I think it's very necessary. Senator Dierks asked about guidelines for child support and he was concerned about child support being a little too...being too high for some individuals. The courts do establish guidelines and they're in the process of working on this. There are guidelines in place now and I think they're looking at the...at reevaluating them. Again, I have an amendment that will be coming up that will allow that noncustodial parent who is having some problems with their child support, their circumstances have changed, a way for them to get into the courts without the costs. It's another area that I don't believe has been fair because if the custodial parent is on ADC and wants child support raised, we take care of handling all the legal expenses where the noncustodial parent does not have that ability. So, hopefully, we will help with that in an amendment that is to come up. This is not the answer to all the visitation interference problems that we have and that individuals have and I appreciate Senator Beutler bringing that up. Again, I think it's a step in the right direction. It's a start. It's an area that we need to deal with and I think this is one way we need to try and see if it can be dealt with this way. I would much prefer to do it this way than to have it be a crime for child...for visitation interference. So, hopefully, we can address some of the problems and help some of the individuals that are having problems with that. Thank you.
