

SENATOR DAY: Yes, that's right, Senator Crosby. If they are receiving ADC payments, they get \$50 of their child support that's paid.

SENATOR CROSBY: Yeah, I thought we should have that clear that, there again, the ADC mother isn't going to get rich on this child support money because most of these people don't have that much money. So probably I'm going to vote to move the amendment and the bill today because, as I said, I think what Senator Beutler said is good, it's a beginning. And I have some little concerns too about those licenses because if you take away the means of getting the money, that isn't going to help the situation any. But I would like to see how it all works and I hope eventually you can bring the mediation thing because that's another part of it. But, you see, as I say, I mentioned this woman in Lincoln who has worked for so long because you see how long she's been at it and how little, how long it takes to get a system to work right and to work correctly. So thank you for bringing the bill. I am concerned. The last thing I will say, the visitation thing and all of this worries me so much because the mother and father, both, use the children as a weapon. So if there's anything we can do to ease that and to make them cooperate with each other, even though they don't care about each other anymore, and take care of that child, then whatever we do will be good. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Crosby. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Madam President. Thank you. And, Senator Day, if I could discuss this with you just for a moment, please.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Day.

SENATOR DAY: Certainly.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Day, being from...not from Lancaster or Douglas County and hearing that there's a referee to serve the rest of the state right now, do I hear that...do I hear that accurately? There is a referee for the other 91 counties?

SENATOR DAY: That's correct.

SENATOR BROMM: To my knowledge, we've never seen that referee.
