

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator. The question before you is the adoption of the Day amendment to the committee amendments to LB 592. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of Senator Day's amendment to the committee amendments.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Day amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Senator Chambers would move to amend the committee amendments. (FA167 appears on page 1814 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers to open on his amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, if you want to see where exactly it is that I'm making the amendment, and I talked to Senator Day about it, if you look on page 1 of Senator Day's amendment to the committee amendments, you will see underlined language that talks about the driver's license. That section carries over to page 2, but I would strike all of Section 25, as it appears in her amendment. All that will be done by striking that entire section from her amendment is to strike the portion that deals with the motor vehicle driver's license. And then I would go to pages 8 through 11 and strike Sections 37 through 43, in their entirety. This would be the textual material that describes the process and procedures by which these licenses are revoked. By striking this language from Senator Day's amendment, it goes only to the aspect of the bill which now relates to visitation. The same issue would still be in LB 592 as far as child support collection, and I'm opposed to it there also. But in this instance it's not too difficult to show the difference between child support collection and visitation. This that we're talking about relates to unreasonable... I wish I could find the language, unreasonable interference or whatever the terminology is. Okay, if you go to page 8, starting in line 14. The Legislature finds and declares that the potential revocation of a professional or occupational license and suspension of a motor vehicle operator's license by the court for unreasonably withholding or interfering with visitation. All right, those are the words, "unreasonably withholding or interfering with visitation". I would like to ask Senator Day a question or two.
