

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR DIERKS: Senator Chambers, you made the remark this morning concerning the amount of pay that, or not the amount, but the fact that Social Services does receive money for their...for their work in this area, is that right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: With...when a woman is on aid and she gets child support, DSS takes part of the amount that is paid in of that child support.

SENATOR DIERKS: Do you know, or do you know of anybody else would know here how much that is?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It probably depends on the amount of child support that the person is receiving, but I can't say exactly how they break it down, but they do get a part of it.

SENATOR DIERKS: Two percent, 20 percent, 75 percent,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: More than 2 percent, I know that, because I know some people who are on ADC, and they mentioned that they are now getting child support. It might be 50 percent, I just don't know. It probably depends on the given case, but I can't tell you. I wish Senator Wesely was here. He probably would know.

SENATOR DIERKS: Okay, thank you. Well, I am having a lot of difficulty with the bill, I think you probably understand that. I won't support it at this point. I think that the one of them that Senator Day brought was helpful. The first one I don't like. I don't like the...and I wish we had been able to adopt Senator Chambers' amendment, which would have stricken the ability for people to go for professional licenses as well as drivers' licenses. I don't really think that a lot of people on the floor understood what that amendment did. I don't think they really understood that doctors of medicine, doctors of veterinary medicine, lawyers, could be subject to losing their license to practice with that amendment, and I guess that I...again I question the constitutionality of that, but at this point, I am not going to be able to support this piece of legislation, and that's one of the reasons. I think we're trying to do something legislatively that we should be looking at judicially, and the judicial system hasn't responded, and it
