

use various ways, I would say individually basis, using a private service in some cases, yes.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, then I guess my final question gets back to my erroneous contention that there's never any free ride, that this is not General Fund, it is revolving fund, it is cash fund from money that's already been appropriated to different agencies, but in your mind is there any potential of an agency coming in and asking for a deficit appropriation because they went over in their budget or in part of their budget because of this...I mean, will this \$750,000 be absorbed within the current budget or is there a potential of it showing up as a deficit appropriation in various bits and pieces of those requests?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, nothing is impossible, but I would say the chance is very slight that we would have a deficit request to cover temporary help unless we knew it as a specific reason such as, say, moving costs. There might be hired, someone has moved and we have to pay moving costs when we don't know what they are. I think we have a very good idea of what it was spent for in nearly all cases. I think it would be remote that we wouldn't know why there was a deficit if it was for some other reason than very legitimate in our minds.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Okay, I think you've answered the...what is the last question actually and that is that you've been on Appropriations Committee through a number of budget cycles and my question in fact was, how intensive is the questioning by the committee for deficit appropriations by the various agencies that do make those requests and I think you've probably pretty well answered that unless there is something you want to add.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Only to say that it is very intensive in most cases. If it's...we have denied deficit requests and made agencies eat that if we thought it was not legitimate. So we look at deficits very closely and...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...even in small amounts, five or ten thousand dollars. We look at those very carefully, just as you would in a claims issue.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Yup. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Well,
