SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask you a question. The tax exemption goes to the person making the purchase. Is that true?

SENATOR BROMM: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now if I purchased this, the only way I get the exemption and don't have to pay the tax is if I'm going to use it in Nebraska. Is that correct?

SENATOR BROMM: I didn't understand your question.
