

amendment...anyway, there is a committee amendment, then there are amendments to the committee amendments, both of which must be looked at in order to see what is in the bill. So what I told you about my amendment being to AM1453 is correct. Now that it's clear to me where we are, I don't have to draft a general amendment saying strike all references to visitation. Some of the items, as Senator Day mentioned and others have indicated, may be advisable as steps in the right direction. But if we are taking steps and we're trying to be reasonable, since this is a new concept that was put into the bill, there's no need in overloading it with things which may not even play a rational part in achieving that which we desire. What we desire is to facilitate the carrying out of rights to visitation. So this material about revoking the licenses does not assist. And when you look at the things to be considered in determining whether or not there has been unreasonable interference with visitation or an unreasonable withholding of visitation right: You get into the types of issues which do not lend themselves to the simplistic threat to revoke somebody's license. And as was pointed out anyway, there may be some custodial mothers who either don't drive or who don't care whether or not they can drive. But here is something that I wish we would look at. The impact of changes on the law in the existing law. Now that Senator Lindsay is here, I will ask him a question. Senator Lindsay, apparently nobody supports your amendment on visitation, although it got added somehow. But here is what I want to ask you. Are you aware of what the penalty is if somebody drives a car while under suspension?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I believe it's up to a year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now would you want a person to go to jail as a part of the refusal, no, not refusal, unreasonable withholding or unreasonable interference in rights of visitation?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Would I want them to go to jail for unreasonably withholding visitation?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR LINDSAY: If that was the only way to enforce visitation similar to child support enforcing child support obligations, and that is one of the things that is available to the court
