SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well if that's available right now, why create an additional situation where a person may wind up serving time for driving under suspension?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I can't answer that.

SENATOR LINDSAY Under either visitation or child support.

If you strike this language you have not really hurt the steps that are attempting to be taken with reference to visitation. We don't want to pour gasoline on a fire. There's an article I clipped and I'll bring it to you which shows where this man had a restraining order brought against him by his wife. He got very upset, took some guns to where she worked, killed her, killed the manager of the store, went out in the parking lot, shot at random and struck another lady in the ankle. When the state tries to micro-manage domestic affairs where you're dealing with people's emotions and the situation is volatile anyway, we should proceed with caution. In the area of enforcement of visitation rights, we have that opportunity. I...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...would ask us to do away with the meat axe and adopt the scalpel.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Bohlke.
