SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: I'm sure Senator Lindsay did and especially if you look at his, I assume if we look at his tax statement probably most of his work has been pro bono to a large degree. Senator Day, if I could continue, let's assume Social Services says that you need to report to the local Social Services office to talk with a caseworker, okay? And by the way, I don't trust Social Services to be able to handle this type of thing very well. They don't do...many cases you and I have had disagreements on how, or agreement on how Social Services has not done well when they've dealt with children and some of the issues, they are overworked, their caseloads are too high and now we're going to put more things on them and to assume that Social Services is going to be able to make rational judgments on these cases, I have strong, strong doubts about this...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ...simply because of their being asked to do too much with too little. But assuming that I'm asked to go to either county attorney's office, local or the local Social Services office where a caseworker is, what would the person need to bring with them to justify what their salary is or what it is not?

SENATOR DAY: They would not do that through Social Service, Senator Bernard-Stevens. That would have to go through the courts because it is court-ordered child support so they would have to go to the referee when they do that.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: But the bill says, I think the bill says and correct me if I'm wrong, if Social Services decides that the license will be revoked, that the Department of Motor Vehicles shall revoke the license...

SENATOR DAY: That's right.
