

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR DAY: The anecdotal story is I hear from other states is once this legislation is passed they start making the payment plans and the money starts coming in before any letter or any notice is sent out and I think that's something important that we need to look at.

SENATOR VRTISKA: So what you're really saying is if it's important enough to keep their automobile rather than to lose their license they're going to do what they're supposed to have done without having to be enforced to do it and in a sense that makes good sense and I guess, as I said earlier, I support what you're doing. I just wanted to get some clarifications on some things that had been brought to my attention and I appreciate your willingness to respond. Thank you very much.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Day, if we can continue that discussion a little bit, again more for my edification I guess or understanding, again, a person in the outstate will go to the county attorney's office in all likelihood if they're being informed that their license may be evoked, and I'm assuming that's either professional or driver's or both. When the person comes to the county attorney's office what is it that they're going to need to have with them?

SENATOR DAY: Well it depends on what they want to do at that stage, Senator. If they come in they have several options. They've gotten a letter, they're told they are three months in arrears. They can go in and they can say, look, I want to make this up, can we set up a payment plan because I can't give you the \$10,000 I owe you right now, and that can be handled and then everything is taken care of as long as they stay with that payment plan. They can come in and say, okay, I got the \$10,000, here it is, everything is taken care of. They can come in and they can say there has been a mistake. I don't owe this money, I've been paying it. At that stage that's where it would go to administrative hearing for a mistaken of fact. And that point they'd have to have proof they had paid their child support.
