

authority of the state, is not liable for negligence unless the state specifically says that they should be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that is what we would be doing. I am asking you, do you think this area is different, we are taking a different approach in this area, so there should be a higher standard placed on the people making these decisions? I am asking you as a question, or would you want to think?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I don't...I would want to think. I don't think negligence would be the proper standard. I think certainly intentional wrongdoing might be a different matter. I'd want to think of where the line should be drawn,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, at least ..

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...compare it to where it has been drawn in other similar situations, and that kind of thing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If...

SENATOR BEUTLER: It's a very complicated question, as you know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Suppose liability were not placed, personal liability would not be placed, but it would give the individual aggrieved a claim against the state, the state would have to respond, what about an approach like that?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, that would be a different approach, that would be a...I think a more traditional approach... to the question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you be willing to think about some of those things and discuss them further?
