It's perfectly legitimate, it does everything we ask for it to do. I have no complaints with it at all, so we'll go ahead now and just work on your amendments as you wish to do it. I'm going to stand in opposition to the amendment and probably will the rest of them. I would like to work with you and do it on a Select File amendment, but if you don't choose to do that, we'll go ahead and work on it right now.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Dierks. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, somehow people think that when I offer something that will improve their bill it helps me. I'm not the one who will look like I don't understand English. My name is not on the bill. I'd like to ask Senator Dierks a question since we're getting testy. Senator Dierks.
