SENATOR DIERKS: Well it depends on what you're talking about came first, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is honey a product of a bee or would they not be included?

SENATOR DIERKS: Yup.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So there is a product that is distinct from the animal.

SENATOR DIERKS: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And there probably are other examples that if we put our minds to it we could come up with. Would you agree?

SENATOR DIERKS: I agree.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are those the things that you had in mind when you brought the bill?

SENATOR DIERKS: No, they're not. The things I had in mind when I brought the bill were those animals that are used for food production and as determined by the Department of Revenue, and they've got the definitions that tell you what they approve. I read it to you a little bit ago.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we talk about any form of animal life of a kind, the products of which. So any form of animal life that produces products which are ordinarily used for human consumption would be included in the narrative of this bill.

SENATOR DIERKS: That's true, but not bacteria.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well let's forget bacteria. That's why I wanted to deal with something bigger that people can grasp like a honey bee.

SENATOR DIERKS: Well we included honey bees.
