

CLERK: 13 ayes, 0 nays to go under call. Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: The house is under call. Would all senators please return to the Chamber and record your presence. Would all unauthorized personnel please leave the floor. Senator Avery, Senator Lindsay, Senator Lynch, the house is under call. Senator Witek. Senator Robak, would you check in, please. Senator Bromm, Senator Dierks, Senator Elmer. Senator Lindsay, Senator Lynch, would you please return to the Chamber, we are under call. Senator Lynch. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Reverse order.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, reverse order. We're still waiting for Senator Lynch. Senator Beutler.
