SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Twenty million is in addition to what we have.

I mean that, I assume that will be another battle on another day, but that is simply a reason to put the money in there, in Cash Reserve, so that it will be...it will be...if it doesn't come, we haven't spent it. Like the field of dreams, if you don't build it, they won't come. If we don't put it in there, and it doesn't come, we haven't missed it. It is not so much to enhance the Cash Reserve Fund, as it is to hedge against the possibility that some of the Maximus money won't come.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Senator Wehrbein, would you be, and, again, I know the answer, and I'm trying to draft the amendment, and I don't know. Senator Crosby, are there any other lights on?
