shooting area, we were told, had a portion of it right next to a sandpit or a lake and part of that shot did go out into the water. So lead shot in an area next to a lake I would think would certainly be in the public interest to be looked at as one of those considerations.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Senator Preister. I'm not rising to oppose controlled shooting areas, per se, that's not my purpose. I do have a concern about...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...that when permits are issued that it is an appropriate location for the application to be granted for the permit to be issued. And I haven't had enough experience with these to know whether those applications are kind of an automatic or not. But this kind of opens up the area, the bill does. And so I think even though we are short of time in the body, it probably is worth a little examination to see whether we have all the appropriate regulations and statutes in place to protect the public interest because I do think that even those that live and try to work around a controlled shooting area should have some consideration in whether or not it's in the best interests of the community or the area for such a permit application to be...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR BROMM: ...to be granted. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Elmer.

SENATOR ELMER: Question.

SENATOR CROSBY: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. The question is, shall debate cease? All in favor vote aye, opposed no. We're voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted. Record, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Madam President.

SENATOR CROSBY: Debate does cease. Senator Preister, would you like to close on your amendment.
