How would you like to have that on your birth certificate? I've told you before a woman down in Texas worked and worked, in the early nineteen hundreds, to get that off the birth certificate. That sarcastic attitude about not being able to use a word is very offensive. But to go back, the last thing I want to say about 1992 and now, pro-choice people were in the forefront of that effort to keep either the nine months or save the last three months. And pro-life and pro-choice joined together. Rush Limbaugh called me a "feminazi" pro-choice person, you see he didn't even know me. He picked up some phrase that he thought that I was the kind of woman that he abhors. I probably am when it comes right down to it because I'm going to defend that life, even if it costs money. So this is where you separate the men from the boys and the women from the girls. Grow up! We have to take care of people who are unfortunate, you can't walk away from that. So I'll support your amendment, Senator Chambers, and there's days when I'd like to come down and say, Senator Chambers, stop talking, but today, keep talking.
