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obligation to speak because when people are talking about patriotism and wars there is a great, overwhelming disinclination on the part of everybody to say anything contrary to what it seems the majority is saying and trying to impose as the orthodox position and view. I don't see this as the great country that Senator Robinson and others...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...do. I'm sure he could give examples as to why he says that and the very examples he gives which will show why he says it will be the very reasons why I say it's not because laws that apply in a certain way to white people do not apply in the same way to black people. One reason I and others battle as hard as we do is because of the ongoing racism and I want to remind Senator Robinson or bring it to his attention for the first time, if he wasn't aware of it, black soldiers were lynched in uniform when returning to this country after World War II.

PRESIDENT RORAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Maurstad.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: Thank you, Madam President, I rise in support of the motion to overrule the Chair with no disrespect. As I look at Rule 2, Section 11, it talks about primarily two things, when and when you cannot. The first part it says personal privilege shall be used, first, affecting, and I'm just going to skip to the dignity of the Legislature because there are comments or commas in that, in that sentence. It appears to me from what I've heard so far what Senator Robinson was going to state during his moment of personal privilege would certainly affect the dignity of the Legislature collectively. The next part of that rule talks about what you shall not do during the time that you use for personal privilege and it says, personal privilege shall not be used to permit any discussion or debate pertaining to any measure pending before the Legislature. Obviously there is nothing that Mr. or Senator Robinson was going to discuss that is about a measure pending before the Legislature. As a result, I feel that his comments would be within the rules of the Legislature and would urge the body to support his motion to overrule the Chair. Thank you, Madam President.
