

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: There will be more people probably coming in too, but what I'm saying is the expenses of the Small Business Compliance Advisory Panel, that's what will come out of this fund. They...they will not be...that's expenses, but that is different from the origination of fees going into this fund.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's what I wanted to make clear.

SENATOR VRTISKA: All right. That gives me a clearer explanation. The only...the only other thing that I would say is, again, reiterate that I do agree with Senator Bromm's feelings about these kind of mandates that were placed on us, particularly in a state that probably has more clean air than most, particularly on the coastal areas where we have a great deal of pollutants, but this is what Uncle Sam says, treat us all alike no matter what it costs. Thank you.
