PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Seeing no further lights, Senator Crosby, do you wish to close?

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Madam Speaker. We've had a good discussion about this idea, and I think it is a really good idea. I think we have to look at it more. And Senator Witek is right, it's not simple to get accountability on something like this. But at this time, rather than take this to a vote, I'll withdraw the amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Crosby. The amendment is withdrawn. Any further amendments? We're back to the Pirsch amendment, and Senator Pirsch, your light is next.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Madam President, I respectfully withdraw this amendment and I also will withdraw...is it my...do I have three next amendments, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Senator, if you bear with me just a moment, I'll be happy...

SENATOR PIRSCH: Sure. And while he's looking, I appreciate Senator Crosby and I appreciate her concern. And we have been talking and I think we really do agree on certain thing such as accountability that these things are not used for the detriment of the unborn child, and also that the fathers should be held accountable. And so to that end, I want to work with Senator Crosby. And I'm hoping that we together could come up with an amendment that we would both find accountable and suitable.

CLERK: Senator, you do have two amendments that have been printed, and based on what you said, you want to withdraw those?

SENATOR PIRSCH: Yes, I will withdraw those.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: It is so ordered.

CLERK: Madam President, the next motion I then have is by Senator Crosby and that would be to indefinitely postpone the bill. Senator Pirsch has the option to lay the bill over.
