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depending on the business, for 775 or 270 type of grants as well?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: They might qualify for 270. but, to tell you the truth, Senator, the ins and outs of 270 and 775 are somewhat beyond my expertise. I doubt they would qualify for 775 because of the...

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: But 270 would be a possibility?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Probably.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Yeah, that was...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: It strikes me as more likely.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Yeah. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, part of what Senator Wickersham said I'm going to agree with in terms of the \$500,000 not being a large amount of money for some of the types of businesses that have been discussed. The whole \$3 million the first year and the following \$3 million, if all of that were in the fund at one time, \$6 million, that is not much for an economic development fund. This is one of those tack-ons that, for whatever purposes being presented to us, is not going to do a great amount of good unless we really focus and limit the reach of this bill. And if we are talking about small businesses, we should have clearly in mind what we mean by a small business. I'm telling you that my perception for the purposes of this bill would not be any company approaching 100 employees; 50 would be more like it. And in some of the bills that we have, some of the laws on the books right now, where we talk about nondiscrimination and so forth, some of those bills or laws will apply if you have fewer than 12 employees, sometimes fewer than 25, but when you start getting to more than that, you're approaching something other than just a small business, as most people would understand that term. So if Senator Janssen would bring an amendment of that kind, I think it would be wholesome. Because of the amendment
