SENATOR AVERY: They are in the majority of counties. I don't have right in front of me which counties they would be in.

SENATOR BOHLKE: And I understand that, but what I would need and hope that you may give a discussion of how we are going to make sure that we have trained volunteers in each of the counties, and the other number I heard was 16,000 children.

SENATOR AVERY: Right.

SENATOR BOHLKE: And that would so give a caseload, if that were true, of 80 for each volunteer, if you wanted to break it down that way, and you said you would notify all interested parties in every...in every review process. Just explaining to me how that...how that is going to work given those kinds of numbers and making sure how long it will take to have trained volunteers in places in each of those counties. So if, on your time, the remainder of my time or on your time, if you would please respond to some of those questions, and then later we will get to the issue of a code agency.

SENATOR AVERY: Okay, I don't know if you misspoke, it was 1,600, 1,600 additional children, not 16,000.

SENATOR BOHLKE: I am sorry, I misunderstood you.

SENATOR AVERY: Right.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Sixteen hundred additional children.

SENATOR AVERY: Right.

SENATOR BOHLKE: And how many are being served today?

SENATOR AVERY: The figures I have, foster care, right, in '94 reviewed 1,936 children.

SENATOR BOHLKE: But would they also...and Department of Social Services, did they do reviews of other...other (interruption).

SENATOR AVERY: Right, they did the other for...what would be roughly 40 percent. I think that is a rough in terms of foster care review is about 60 percent...
