SENATOR AVERY: Right.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That doesn't...well, that doesn't compute. But let me go back to your...there are 21 employees, but they have only 15 FTE's, is that correct?

SENATOR AVERY: Full-time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: But what...what is their ..they have only 15 full-time employees. But what...what are they allowed as far as full-time employees, full-time equivalents...

SENATOR AVERY: Fifteen is my understanding.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...or FTE's.

SENATOR AVERY: Fifteen FTE's, they have 15 FTE's, that's full-time employees, that's allowed...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, no, no, I don't...okay.

SENATOR AVERY: Maybe I'm missing your...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, and I may be wrong. We'll let that one drop for a minute, okay? And...and I...these questions seem picky and I guess they are in a way, but I think we need to understand here what the possible fiscal implications, long-term, could be of a change like this. And that's why I'm asking you, so just for that explanation. The other thing that I would like for somebody to address, and I don't know, maybe Senator Day or someone could...and certainly, Senator Avery, you could, I've heard it said here on the floor a couple of times now that every child will be reviewed according to this bill. But that wasn't the understanding that I had based on what I had heard at some meeting or some discussion, that there would still be children that would not be reviewed, and if my memory serves me correctly, those children are children who are in corrections and private placements, those kinds of things. And I...I want...I want that point brought out and clarified because I think there are some people on the floor who are wondering about that, too.
