SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. I have spoken three times on the amendment, itself (interruption)...

SENATOR HALL: On the amendment, itself, yes, you have.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, I just want to be sure. I get along with Senator Hall pretty well, but I am not going to let him cheat me out of any time, but he is correct on this one because he was told by his cohorts that he is correct.

SENATOR HALL: My able assistants, yes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did you say evil or able? I would say able, if they are to your right. If they're to your left...

SENATOR HALL: Able, and you are now down to four and a half minutes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, but it was thirty seconds well spent. Senator Wickersham's amendment, by taking out this requirement of competitiveness with other states means that that doesn't have to be considered any more. If that is stated in the bill, it has to be given consideration, and that's the only reason he could have for striking it. Let me ask Senator Wickersham a question, though, before I go into the business of trying to read his mind.
