Senator Robinson had a good idea. As we look back on it, Senator Chambers brought to light some interesting things, and so I think we should listen to what the rest of the body has to say, and for now, we all have our priorities. I do, you do, we can't always get what we want. I want the FFA, I want the 4-H members to have a life, and come forward with a good thought of what Nebraska did for them. Maybe you don't all agree, but I think that it starts out when they are young and we build from there, just like we have these young folks up here in the audience looking at us. It starts out in the young. You nurse a seed, you nurse the tree as it grows. As the tree gets bigger, it doesn't need all the nursing. I think...that's my priority. Maybe it is not yours. Let's talk about this and come up with a reasonable solution, and I do appreciate Senator Chambers maybe slowing this stream down a little bit, appreciate it.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Beutler, your light is next.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Hall, and members of the Legislature, I oppose the bracket motion, and I think that the motion, itself, is extraordinarily lacking in perspective and proportion. And let me tell you what I mean. It's...first of all, it must be recognized as an extraordinary motion and a motion that complicates our processes immeasurably, and for that reason, that is why it is extraordinary. But it is extraordinary in the sense that since I've been aware of how the Legislature has acted, since 1978, this the second time that such a motion has been seriously put forward, and we all have to
