

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR ROBINSON: If this bill would fail, which I think it probably will, would you be amenable to an amendment that would put money in for the Camp Fire Girls and the Boy Scouts and the Girl Scouts and the Cub Scouts? I have a lot of young people in my district that are 4-H Club members, too, but they participate in these other activities. And it seems to me that, you know, we ought to get everyone involved in this. What do you think about that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I have pondered that question, Senator Robinson. I was a scoutmaster. I pondered the question of whether we should open it up to all of them. I think they more or less specialize, they specialize in life naturally but they specialize in their field. I'm not sure the Boy Scouts would want such a thing. I would have to talk it over with them first where the 4-H people, they're more or less the whole...encompass every walk of life whether it's with agriculture, whether it's homemaking, whether they sew or whether they build whereas your Boy Scouts they are prepared.

SENATOR ROBINSON: They what now? You mean they concentrate on one thing?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Who?

SENATOR ROBINSON: Boy Scouts? Did you ever look at their merit badge book? My gosh..

SENATOR CUDABACK: I didn't say that. I said they're a group that will stand on their own two legs as such and they can stand on their own two legs. They go out and they have fund raisers as such. The Girl Scouts, they have these different type of fund raisers and I would certainly want to talk it over with them before we include anything like that in the bill.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Can't the 4-H have fund raisers?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Sure we have fund raisers but I mean it encompasses, anyone can join the 4-H program. We have them all over from every walk of life and it's a different kind of a social, whether you want to call it that, program.

SENATOR ROBINSON: I'm not so sure it is. I'm not sure. I
