SENATOR WESELY: Right.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Will it... it may show how the money is spent. I guess some of the things that I would like to see in addition to that as far as legislative oversight goes is comparisons to what was there before so we can tell financially if there were any differences under the managed health care system that we're initiating versus what it cost before, dollarwise, and where those... the...the money originated from in the first place and then also somewhere to look at the benefits to individuals if the care has changed any for these individuals because of the managed care health system. Do you see any way that we could incorporate that, that that would be part of your amendment?

SENATOR WESELY: I would... that's actually kind of the intent, in part at least, and I talked and we're going to look at some further language that would accomplish that. We just couldn't get it done in the time we had so, yeah, we'll work with you on it.

SENATOR HILLMAN: I appreciate your bringing the amendment and I think there's several other areas, not only through DPI but DSS, Department of Health is doing some changes whereby we can do what I referred to as some measurement in government and I think this is a very good start so I thank you for bringing the amendment.
