SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Day, this bill does not put any requirements on these people in terms of their training, does it?

SENATOR DAY: Which people, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: These gratuitous nurses. Anybody can say that they are one of these persons and carry on all the functions of a nurse so long as it's in the context of this religious belief. Isn't that true?

SENATOR DAY: We have identified in different places in this bill who can be called a nurse or not, and I don't remember if that will affect that. I remember that being in there, Senator Chambers. If that will affect this part of it, I'm not sure.
