

don't end up...they can be compensated for it but, in the end, they don't...they can't become a nurse and not really be a nurse. So...and, again, this has been in the statute for a long time but it was stricken. But I think we're...I'm going to give time to Senator Day at this point.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Day.

SENATOR DAY: I would like to substitute the amendment, please, with the one I just took up on the desk which will strike the reinstatement of this language. (FA225 appears on pages 2232-33 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT ROBAK: It is so ordered. Senator Day, anything further on that amendment?

SENATOR DAY: What it does is we leave that language stricken.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Day, just one question, if I may with regard...

SENATOR DAY: Certainly.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...to the remaining language.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Day.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I'm not familiar enough with the bill to know whether I'm even asking a proper question, but is...part of what this amendment does, does it allow licensed nurses to use the services of unlicensed individuals to provide assistance with personal care and activities of daily living? It does do that, right?

SENATOR DAY: Yes, it does. It's for in the nursing homes many times when they need to do the bathing and that type of thing, under an LPN then they can...and I don't want to use the wrong word here because we've gotten into semantics over these words, but they can delegate for a nurse's aide to do the bathing and that type of thing. That's what that is intended to do.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. To the extent that we need a statutory change to do that kind of thing, it seems to me that there must
