

in it through the Executive Board, as we already are in some of those processes where the university is spending money for certain purposes.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay, thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brashear, could I ask you a question please.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Senator Bromm.

SENATOR HALL: Senator Brashear, will you respond.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Brashear, under your amendment, Section 4 stays in the bill, or in...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...the amendment, which says that a contingent fee contract of any kind whatsoever is void, is that right?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: In the amendment, it is void...one minute. It is void unless executed by the Governor upon 30 days notice to the public at large.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: We are making a public policy statement that you cannot have a contingency agreement on behalf of the State of Nebraska, or with the State of Nebraska except in that manner.

SENATOR BROMM: And are you...the notice would be by any particular method or is that something that needs to be...is that defined somewhere else in statutes, or would that need to be worked on a little?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: It is not defined...I do not know whether it is defined anywhere else, but I chose that language as being the best thing I could come up with in a hurry, to be honest, and as being expansive enough to be clear. Notice to the public at large would at least attract the attention of people in this body who are paying attention. I believe it would attract the attention of the media,...

SENATOR BROMM: Sure.
