SENATOR CHAMBERS: And do you remember that one of the portions stricken would be what we find on page 9 of the present contract dealing with unavailability of funding, and the current contract says that if there is a failure of funds as a result of no appropriation, the contract can be terminated?

SENATOR ROBINSON: I can't answer that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Well, that is on page 9 of your current contract. In the revision, all of that language is going to be stricken. This is what you all are doing by going
